### **Executive Update**

Welcome to April! April is the time of year where we begin to see transition in the desert and in the community. Cooler days and evenings begin to warm and as that occurs, we see the resident snowbirds leave the community for cooler temperatures and our Canadian neighbors that must leave to stay in compliance with the law. In the Coachella Valley, we see the completion of the BNP Tennis tournament that had approximately 500,000 patrons come through the gates and brace for three weekends of concerts in April that bring almost as many people with Coachella and Stagecoach. In all, April signals one of the last big months of tourists and part timers here before they leave the valley, with us year-rounders hunkering down for our high temperatures to follow in the coming months.

On the Association side, staff is hunkered down as well with the finalizing of our budgets. Starting in December (and in some cases, even earlier) staff begins to see what we have spent in our fiscal year to date and plan projections for the balance of our fiscal year. Months of meetings with staff and vendors take place to ensure we are getting the best pricing and spending for what is needed. These departmental budgets are then reviewed with members of the accounting team and GM to get to a final number which is then submitted to the Finance Committee (Fincom) and Board. After the Fincom and Board have had ample time for review, there is a joint meeting where they and the staff review each department's budget. This is an all-day meeting and guarantees the budget is properly vetted prior to Fincom making a recommendation to the Board. This year, the joint meeting will be held April 7 and the Board will vote on the budget at the May 6 Board meeting. This process includes both the operating budget as well as the budget for reserves.

It is also worth noting that in this process, staff, Fincom and the Board are aware of the comments made by residents relating to the cost increase of dues. We hear almost daily from the residents how they are impacted by the rising costs of food (especially eggs), milk, gas, utilities, insurance, etc. The Association is not immune from these cost increases and they have the same impact on our operations. Additionally, our staff is facing like challenges with cost increases in their daily lives. In the budget process, we take these factors into consideration and through a united effort work to deliver a responsible budget that reflects what it takes to operate Sun City to keep it as the premier Active Adult Community that it is... and which is reflected in all the awards we have received, including most recently *Best in the Desert*!

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### FINANCIAL REPORT

THROUGH JANUARY 2025



The January 2025 financials were presented to the Finance Committee on February 28. January finished the month down (\$59K) to budget, (\$230K) actual vs. (\$171K) budget. Golf Shop revenue was down and missed budget in January by (\$39K), \$594K actual vs. \$633K budget. Golf rounds for were down (130) and (\$51K) for the month. Twilight

rounds were down (195) and (\$18K), and 18-hole rounds were down (\$35K). YTD, Golf Shop is down (\$222K) to budget.

Food & Beverage revenues were down to budget by (\$102K) for January; \$296K actual vs. \$398K budget. Daily Grind was down (\$325), Catering was down (\$21K), and Boulevards was down (\$80K). The F&B Department did manage their flow-thru of expenses in Boulevards. With revenues down (\$80K), they decreased \$31K on their Cost of Sales and \$38K on salary and wages. Year-to-date Boulevards is up \$19K to budget, (\$334K) actual vs (\$353K) budget.

Boulevards remains closed on Mondays.

HR had 10 positions on their February 24 Open Positions Report. These open positions include 4 F&B Boulevards, 3 Facilities Maintenance and 3 Golf Course Maintenance.

Twenty-five homes closed escrow in January. Reserve Replenishment Assessment (RRA) revenues were \$62,550 for January; fiscal year-to-date revenues are \$366,421.50.

Rolling forecasts were prepared this month including seven months actual and five months forecast. Currently, we are slightly under budget for the fiscal year on the Operations Statement. However, on the Consolidated Statement of Operations, which includes the Spectrum Rebate, (restricted for the Solar Project), we continue to make budget.

On a side note, the Golf Shop made budget in February. Revenues were \$706,605 actual vs. \$673,420 budget, an increase of \$33,185 over budget. This is a revenue increase of \$128,120 year-over-year for February.

Managers continue to look for opportunities to increase revenues and decrease costs.

The Association remains in a sound financial position.



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

In April, we will visit The Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens. We will also continue our Bingo games in addition to our final Trivia Night of the season.



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### **Public Safety Committee**

#### Do You Know Who Resides On Your Street?

I have written an article about this before, but as I talk to many residents, I have discovered that many still do not "know their neighbors" or know only one or two of them. One of the most important things you can do is know who lives on the same street as you and what type and color of car they drive. A Sheriff's Department Officer confirmed this at their last safety presentation. What if there is a strange car parking on your street regularly and it doesn't belong to any of your neighbors? Does the owner/driver of that car have legal or illegal business on your street? Is someone casing out your street for later activities?

Yes, we live in a gated community, but you are responsible for doing things to protect yourself. Knowing your neighbors does not mean that you must call or visit them every day. But knowing their name, address, phone number, and type and color of the car they drive could be very helpful. In essence, you are watching out for each other. When you are going to be gone for a while, do you let a neighbor know you are leaving? Do you fill out the form which lets our Patrol and the Entry Gate know the dates you will be gone? Do you put your mail and newspaper on hold? Many burglaries occur during the day.

Another safety item: have you checked out the people you have coming into your home to do work for you? Anyone can place an ad on Nextdoor or other media talking about the superior work they do. Check their references carefully before hiring them. When you hire someone, put all your valuables away, don't tell or show them what you have or where it is hidden, and never leave them alone. Most people who are hired are honest, but you should still check them out. You could also ask neighbors and friends if they know anything about the possible hires.

Do you walk your property periodically to check it out? A recent news story told of a camera being hidden in someone's yard, which meant someone else was watching their activities.

My District Delegate always ends her newsletter to us with a wonderful thought, "Let's remember to continue to look out for each other. Stay safe."

### Sun City Strategic Plan: It's Relevance to our Residents

Over the past fifteen years, Sun City has implemented four distinct Strategic Plans: 2010, 2012, 2018, and 2024. Each plan outlined various objectives aimed at addressing both existing and emerging issues, with the goal of protecting and enhancing the well-being of our residents.

Initially, these objectives were conceptual, requesting the Board of Directors to develop plans and establish Committees to address specific areas of concern or perceived need. For instance, the 2012 Plan recommended the creation of strategies to expand facility space, develop a communitywide disaster recovery plan, formulate an external marketing plan to attract new residents, devise a plan to welcome new residents and increase their awareness of available services and amenities, and establish an Ad-Hoc Committee to identify and train potential volunteers, particularly for leadership roles. Additionally, it promoted the increased use of services by assessing satisfaction with existing services and conducted focus groups to determine the demand for new services.

The 2018 Strategic Plan adopted a more focused approach, identifying four key objectives: the development of a community disaster recovery plan; the creation of an Ad-Hoc Committee to explore cable/internet options beneficial to residents; ensure new members of the Board and the Delegate Council receive appropriate training; and identify internal sources for operational analysis.

The current Plan (2024–2028) takes a significantly different approach, categorizing objectives into seven distinct categories

with specific goals outlined within each category. Unlike previous plans, which were based on resident surveys and some interviews, the current Plan employed a more extensive method to gather input.

I have invited Scott Erickson, Chair of Strategic Planning Committee and a former member of the Board of Directors, to discuss the differences between previous strategic plans and the current one, and to explain the relevance of the Strategic Plan to the residents of Sun City.

#### **Q:** How would you compare the level of resident input in the development of prior plans to the current plan?

A: Thanks Charlie, first, let me make a brief comment about the Committee. The Strategic Planning Committee is made up of six (6) talented and driven volunteers, a strong Board Liaison and our General Manager. Each is a strong leader with a selfless desire to improve Sun City daily. Together, they simply make things happen.

Having worked on several strategic plans in the past, I can say that they were all well written with the same strong desire to improve our community. However, without critical ongoing management, they lost relevance in the years to follow and never seemed to fully connect with the community.

This Committee decided to make sure that would not happen again. So, with the benefit of decades of hindsight we all readily agreed that community-wide participation and permanent plan management would be the key to our

success. Putting words into action, the Committee listened to and documented the community's needs, ideas and opinions for many months before developing a single goal.

- **Q:** How do the goals found in earlier plans differ from those in the current plan?
- A: In fairness, I can't really say our goals and objectives sound or look all that different from those stated in prior plans. However, what I will say without hesitation is they honestly represent the priority needs of the Association as voiced by its residents and its staff. Furthermore, continuing our desire for complete transparency, our plan is now readily available to the public. Yes, the Strategic Plan is a "living" document, accessible to review and track on our new Sun City resident website.

Our achievements and Updated Strategic Plan can be seen whenever you choose to do so.

- **Q:** Could you elaborate on how residents have received help from the recommendations of the current plan? For example, what benefits arise from expanding space in our various facilities?
- A: We're all proud to make note of the Committee's many achievements so far, and even more excited about the expanding spaces we plan to track very soon. We are also delighted to acknowledge the unwavering support of the Board and the continuous engagement of our GM and the HOA Management Staff. Without their support and timely actions nothing could have been accomplished.

That said, this plan is clearly a prioritized list of actions. Example: **Goal 1 – Technology** 

First, you cannot create a better website without first creating a plan to clean up our data, synchronize our software and finally digitize all our critical records to effectively manage it in the future. And of course, none of this can happen without knowledgeable leadership. With Brian Locke, we now have a strong foothold on critical management through digital technology. From the creation of a new internal website, to improving gate access, to cleaning up our databases, our new Technology team has already made incredible progress.

#### Another example is Goal 3 – Facilities

Space has always been a top priority here in Sun City. From the need to store club materials, to ballroom tables and chairs, to simply improving the look and feel of our clubhouses. We are constantly moving things around to hopefully find the best use of our facilities.

Using your term, 'expanding space' is the only real and permanent answer. The Plan addresses this goal by providing the Board and Management Staff with a priority list of recommendations to expand. These are long-term actions that can permanently address decades of neglect of community assets and inefficient use of space in our facilities.

The Board has recently approved funding to update the Mountain View Clubhouse, with work to begin in May. A request for a prefab storage unit at the east end of the Mountain View ramp has been identified as a top priority by the SPC, and will be presented for approval as part of the FY2025/2026 budget. These two actions will provide the Association with an opportunity to clean up many rooms bordering on inefficient and unsafe storage.

- **Q:** Finally, how do we keep residents informed about the progress and achievements of these objectives?
- A: Well, I guess I jumped the gun on this one, but I believe it's worth repeating. The Strategic Plan is a "living" document, accessible to review and track on our new Sun City resident website. Our achievements and plan updates can be seen whenever your curiosity moves you to check things out yourself.

#### **Compliance** Committee

#### The Appellate Court

As stated here numerous times, the Compliance Committee has nothing to do with the issuance of violation citations. Those are made by the Security Patrol over which the Committee has no jurisdiction. However, the Committee is assigned the task of reviewing all citations and acting as a "court of appeals" for residents who believe that the citation was a mistake or that there are extenuating circumstances that are grounds for dismissal.

The received citation provides information on how appeals can be made, either by letter or by appearing for a hearing. The citation states to whom, where and when the letter is to be sent. The same information is provided for appearances. Appeals are heard the first Thursday of each month at 1:30 p.m., usually in the Saddleback room in the Mountain View Clubhouse.

If appearing for a hearing, the resident will find a sign-in sheet outside the meeting room door and should wait to be called in, which will be on a first come first serve basis. Once inside the resident will be asked to present his or her case. If the violation is a failure to stop, a video of the incident will be shown. Committee members may have questions to ask. The resident will be informed that the decision will be mailed within two weeks. The Committee then considers

### **SURVIVING** The Big One

#### April 3, Thursday, 9 to Noon, Sierra Ballroom, MVCH

One of the biggest dangers of earthquakes may be indifference or denial. The attitude that, this cannot happen to me and therefore isn't necessary, is sad because your preparation for disasters does make a difference in survival. We won't know when earthquakes will occur but we do know they will happen in our area with no advance notice and at a significant magnitude to cause widespread damage. This is an opportunity to update your plans or find out what to do.

LECEPTU Ken Eklund's detailed presentation is on "Surviving the Big One" (and what to do to prepare) and Robyn Mack will talk about our community's response plan and how to get help in a disaster when 9-1-1 services are not available. Find out if your plans are in sync with what is going on in the community.



Discover Do you know where your District Command Post is, who your Block Captain is and the location of the emergency First Aid Stations? Learn what our special teams are able to do to assist you and our community. These are things you need to know before a disaster occurs.

**WISIT US** There are lots of handouts available to help you plan to care for your needs in a disaster as well as other subjects. For example, ideas to prevent your home from flooding, hints to deal with our summer heat, gate locations in case evacuation is called for, home fires and wildfires. There is an all-encompassing handout on Important Documents to save for disasters and also estate planning. The following two pages in this magazine are on Utility Shutoff, a good thing to know when you go on vacation as well as an emergency.

You'll want to see Ralph & Vicki Gribben, who can help with your emergency preparedness supplies, including assembling items for your Grab-N-Go Bag (ask about a 2-person, 3-day bag). They can answer your questions about solar generators for personal use.

Also consider obtaining some additional items to add to your current preparations. The Vialof-Life is available, Blue Can water can be ordered, basic First Aid kits and information will be available and you can pick up an OK/HELP sign in case if you don't have one.

Then tour the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to see how it functions. Check with our EOC table staff for details. It's located just around the corner by the outdoor swimming pool.


# **Utilities Shutoff**


This article deals with emergencies you can learn to handle ahead of time. It is good practice to keep this information in your garage where it is easily located and reviewed periodically.

#### WATER SERVICE TO THE HOUSE:

The water service shutoff to your house is normally located on the walkway leading up to your front door. There are 2 valve handles. The upper one shuts off the service to the house. The lower one turns off the irrigation system. If the valve handle is parallel (in line) with the water pipe, then the water is on. If the valve handle is perpendicular to the water pipe, then the water is off. To turn water service to your house OFF, turn the top handle 90 degrees. After a major earthquake, it is recommended that the water to your home be turned off until it is determined the city water system has not been contaminated.



We all know how disruptive water damage can be. Our houses are between 20 and 30 years old, and some preventative measures could help minimize the risks. Replacement of valve and connections may be in order for any appliances using water. Lastly, when you leave for vacation or any extended period, it is recommended you close the water service line to your house, leaving the irrigation line in the "on" position. Having a friend walk through your house when you are gone is another good idea.



#### WATER HEATER:

Water heaters are normally located in the garage. They hold 40 to 60 gallons of fresh water. To access this water, turn OFF the gas supply to the water heater, & turn OFF the input water supply to the water heater (or outside to the house). Once the gas and water are shut off, open the pressure relief valve on the top of the tank. Now you can open the drain valve at the tank's bottom to access the water. There may be some amount of sediment in the first few gallons of water from the tank. A dishtowel or other clean cloth can be used to filter this water for use.

#### FLUME SMART HOME WATER MONITOR:

This device monitors your home's indoor and outdoor water use 24/7 and notifies you instantly if it detects a leak. Coachella Valley Water District may still offer a discount program for this product. Contact 760-398-2651 or check it out at www.cvwd.org/rebates

#### GARAGE DOOR:

During a power outage, your garage door can be operated manually. Pull down on the *red cord*. This will disengage the automatic mechanism. You will hear a click. Once the door disengages, you can lift it up from the handle on the door's bottom left. Then to restore the door's automatic system, pull the red cord back towards the door motor. Again you will hear a click. Golf cart doors will operate in the same manner.




electrician to diagnose the problem.

Locate the circuit breaker box on the outside of your house. Inside the box, you will find several smaller circuit breakers marked 15, 20, 30 or 40 amp. The one you are looking for is the main circuit breaker, which has the label SERVICE DISCONNECT, 200 amps. Turn that OFF and it will shut off all power to your house. DO NOT restore the power by yourself. Seek the assistance of a licensed, professional

#### GAS METERS:

If you smell natural gas leaking, you may want to shutoff your gas at the gas meter located outside your home in order to prevent fire. As you face the meter, you'll see a pipe running from the ground to the meter. There is a shutoff valve running parallel with the pipe, usually about 6 to 8 inches above ground. Take a 12-inch or larger adjustable wrench and turn the valve 1/4 turn in either direction, until the valve is crosswise to the pipe. Keep this wrench next to your valve, but not on the meter or other equipment. After a few years, you may also want to have SoCal Gas come out to determine if the valve is stuck.

NEVER turn your gas back on yourself, have the gas company restore your service. For safety, a shutoff valve should be installed at every natural gas appliance and if a leak happens at one appliance, you can turn off the gas at the appliance rather than shutting off all of your natural gas service.

#### Five Principles of a Healthy Diet

What's the healthiest way to eat? It depends on who you ask. Many medical and nutrition experts claim to know the "perfect" way to eat for health, yet some of these dietary advocates disagree with each other in some fundamental ways. So, who's right...and who's wrong?

While details may vary from diet to diet, all healthy eating plans have these five principles in common:

- 1. Lots of plants. Plant foods-vegetables, fruits, legumes, whole grains, nuts and seeds-offer a wealth of vitamins and minerals, as well as fiber and healthful compounds called phytochemicals (literally plant chemicals, natural substances in plants that offer humans a range of health benefits, including antioxidant, anti-inflammatory, and even anticancer activity). At the same time that many plant foods are high in nutrients, they are relatively low in calories. The combination of high nutrient content and low calories—a quality known as nutrient density means that a plant-heavy diet can be good for health and weight loss. Because people often underestimate how large their portions of fruits and vegetables should be, Harvard nutritionists devised the Harvard Healthy Eating Plate to provide a graphic representation of a healthy dinner-fully half the plate contains produce.
- 2. Adequate protein. Research shows it's important to eat enough protein, but there are many ways to get that protein, and some are more healthful than others. People who limit how much meat they eat tend to have lower risks for chronic diseases. Plant protein sources (beans, lentils, soy foods, nuts, seeds) and seafood offer the most health benefits. Getting enough protein, along with physical activity, is important for staying strong, healthy and independent.
- 3. **Minimally processed foods.** A 2019 National Institutes of Health study definitively showed eating a diet high in ultra-processed foods causes weight gain and unhealthy

shifts in blood sugar and blood cholesterol. For the healthiest diet, rely as much as possible on whole foods (that is, unprocessed foods, such as broccoli, apples and almonds) and minimally processed foods (such as plain yogurt, canned tuna and natural peanut butter). Processing strips away nutrients while adding extra fats, sugars and sodium, not to mention other additives and preservatives.

4. Limited saturated fats, added sugars and sodium. The U.S. Government's Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend limiting saturated fat intake to less than 10% of daily calories. The same goes for added sugars (sugars added during processing). If you have a 2,000-calorie-a-day

diet, that means that no more than 200 calories a day should come from added sugars. As for sodium, keep it below 2,300 milligrams (mg) per day. The average American consumes more than 3,400 mg per day.

5. **Balance and variety.** To meet nutrient needs, it's important to choose a variety of nutrient-dense foods across and within all food groups. Choosing nutrient-dense foods helps you get the nutrients you need without taking in too many calories.

While everyone needs carbohydrates, fat and protein, there is no magic ratio that you should be striving for, as long as you avoid extremes.

### Golf Shop NEWS

For most, perhaps it means we are just too busy with our hectic daily lives. We cram as much as we can into any given day until we realize, "Where did the time go?"

For others, "time flies" means we are getting older. But the fact of the matter is it took the same amount of time to get old as it did when we were growing up, experiencing all that life throws at us and deciding what we wanted to do with our lives, and we had all the time in the world to do it. I suppose as we get older, time is of the essence, we want to make the most, do the most we can with what father time has left for us. The moral of this brief pondering is this: make the most of every second of every minute of every day before life's game clock expires.

- Be sure to read the two-page article in this month's magazine explaining how to shut off your utilities if it is necessary during an emergency. It will be important when and if you need it, and you will wish you had saved the article.
- The financial report mentioned that Food & Beverage and Golf Operations were behind projections for the year. F&B has compensated by reducing costs and golf is down across the board in the Coachella Valley.
- The fitness centers can expect new treadmills to arrive in April. A new misting system is being installed in the baseball dugout. The HOA has received some additional AEDs (Automated External Defibrillators).
- The Stater Brothers parking lot has become a high crime area.
  - People have the habit of leaving their keys in their car or golf cart. They also tend to leave purses and golf clubs in their golf carts.
  - By now most of us are aware of the attack on a Sun City Resident. It is important to remain vigilant when parking and returning from shopping, Many crimes occur because we are too comfortable with the security inside our gates.
    Sun City security does not patrol the Stater Bros parking lot. People have been curious about the trailer with the high blue light on it in the Stater Brothers parking lot. It has cameras monitoring that part of the lot.
- The first of the seven individual solar projects, the Golf Maintenance Building has completed all but the final IID approval. It should be turned on soon.
  - We will be digging trenches in the parking lots to lay the cables that will connect the solar panels to the clubhouses.
  - The latest anticipated date for the completion of the entire solar project is May. We are at the mercy of IID in getting approvals.
- There is concern over renters not knowing some of the basic HOA rules. It is the responsibility of the homeowner to make certain their tenants have the information. Renters are required to make a refundable \$500 deposit when acquiring an ID card. This is to cover unpaid charges made with the card.
- There will be a pet parade April 12, 10 a.m. to 12 p.m., in the Mountain View parking lot near the Engineering building.
- Chef Edgar is the new chef at Boulevards. He is now on the job.
- We can expect some minor inconveniences during the summer clubhouse renovations.
  - Some meeting rooms will be closed for remodeling this summer. Please be patient as rescheduling is worked out.
    We can anticipate all clubhouse remodeling to be concluded by late September or early October.
- We lost 15 date palms due to the excess summer heat and higher soil salinity. Bids are going out for their replacement.
- The Board is aware some of our streets are sadly in need of resurfacing.
  - The original plan with CVWD was that CVWD would work on replacing the main lines throughout the complex in a sequential manner and would follow up by resurfacing the streets they worked on. However, CVWD has had to await sufficient funding each time before they restart the project.
  - It is clear we cannot wait for CVWD to begin resurfacing our streets so we will begin street repair.

- The current water main project will be in District 6 and a portion of District 7. Completion of this phase is expected by February 2026.

### Sam Hollenbeck: Martha's Village & Kitchen (Indio and Palm Springs)

Sam is the President/CEO of a great organization here, Martha's Village & Kitchen. He relocated to Sun City in 2021, worked as Vice President and took over the helm in April 2022. However, he worked for Martha's previously in 2017/18 in the finance department taking over for someone on leave.

Sam was born and raised in Baldwin Park, CA. His parents met while in the military in Japan during the Korean War. His father, who was from Iowa, was in the army and his mother, from Indiana, was a WAC. They stayed connected after the war, subsequently marrying, and moving to Baldwin Park. Both of his parents worked but at the age of 40 (they were the same age) quit their jobs and went to work together for the post office.

While in high school Sam told me he was <sup>1</sup>/4-mile from the original In & Out Burger yet he never ate there. (Note: he has subsequently partaken of their fabulous burgers). After high school he chose to go to Cal State Los Angeles, with the idea of becoming a history or math teacher, but a professor talked him into accounting classes and that was that. After graduating, he spent two years with Coopers & Lybrand in Newport Beach before moving on to other opportunities.

Prior to returning to the valley, he worked for Swift Communications, a newspaper and magazine publisher, at both their Roseburg, Oregon and Greeley, Colorado offices. He was lured back to Swift from Martha's, but his heart was here.

Sam is a huge fan of Martha's, not because of his job but because of the amazing things they do. He's very proud of the fact that during Covid they were one of the very few places that could still feed people. Usually, the public lunch is buffet style but during

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Covid the staff and volunteers packed the food in containers and handed it out at the door. They also handed out packaged food from the food pantry.

Martha's Village & Kitchen in Indio is a homeless shelter. They have 130 beds spaces, 96 for families so they can stay together, and two hospital rooms (with an RN, LVN and CNA) for recuperating after hospital discharge. People are allowed 90 days at the shelter. They are assisted with finding new housing benefits they are entitled to and finding jobs. The food pantry gives out food for three meals/three days. Once a month, they package and distribute food for the USDA. After 90 days most people have moved into permanent housing. According to the county, the success rate has been 80%. They also have a low- to no-cost 55-seat (or crib) daycare

for children 0-5yrs, which will expand to 102 seats in 2025. This allows parents to afford childcare while working.

#### How can you help or volunteer at Martha's?

Monetary donations are always welcome. Martha's also has a Thrift Store on Requa & Fargo in Indio. They accept all kinds of items: furniture, electronics, clothing, sports equipment, etc., and they have a free pick-up service for larger items. They need volunteers to work in the Thrift Store, kitchen for lunches, packaging bags of food for distribution and USDA food distribution monthly. They serve everyone...homeless, seniors, low-income individuals, and families.

Sam loves his job and planning for the future growth of Martha's. I would say his title should be President/CEO/ Biggest Cheerleader.

The Coachella Valley is full of worthwhile volunteer opportunities in addition to Martha's Village, such as: Animal Samaritans, Boys and Girls Club, Coachella Valley Rescue Mission, Desert Arc, FIND Food Bank, Rite Care Childhood Language Center, The Living Desert, etc.

Oliver's appeal may be due to her accessibility. She writes verse in a conversational style, with no typographical gimmicks.

I don't know exactly what a prayer is. I do know how to pay attention, how to fall down into the grass, how to kneel down in the grass, how to be idle and blessed, how to stroll through the fields, which is what I have been doing all day.

Oliver put together a collection of Molly Malone Cook's photographs (*Our World*) after Cook's death and included the prose poem, "The Whistler." After living with Cook for thirty years, Oliver found out Cook could whistle.

I know her so well, I think. I thought. Elbow and ankle. Mood and desire. Anguish and frolic. Anger too. And the devotions. And for all that, do we even begin to know each other? Who is this I've been living with for thirty years? This clear, dark, lovely whistler?

# Pass the Popcorn

## Love Hurts

Starring Ke Huy Quan and Ariana DeBose

A fun "popcorn" kind of movie. Two unlikely stars (and Best Supporting Oscar winners) Quan (*Everything Everywhere All at Once*) and DeBose (Spielberg's 2021 remake of *West Side Story*) headline this mash-up of comedy, crime, mayhem and kung-fu fighting.

OVE HURT

Quan plays Marvin, a mild-mannered, upbeat real estate agent in Milwaukee, who's very happy with his life. But that's about to change. His billboards are everywhere, and he is stunned to see every one of his photos have been vandalized with a black magic marker moustache. This can only mean that Rose (DeBose), the woman he loves and mob accountant who worked for Marvin's brother (a ruthless mob boss), is back. This is not a good thing, especially since Marvin (who, in his former life, was an enforcer for his brother Alvin and actually had a moustache), was supposed to kill Rose for stealing \$2 million from Alvin. But because Marvin really cared for Rose, he just pretended to kill her, telling her to disappear and never come back. But now Rose has returned, determined to extract revenge on Alvin, and her two cohorts who betrayed her and stole the money for themselves.

This all seems very straightforward, and frankly derivative of dozens of movie plotlines. A few things make this one fun and a little different, all while being reminiscent of so many before it. There's a nod to *Pulp Fiction*'s John Travolta and Samuel Jackson, two gangster-killers who enjoy a very easygoing camaraderie, while they're beating people up. Here the guys, André Eriksen and Marshawn Lynch, who work for Alvin and are looking for Rose, spend their time discussing André's marital woes. Marvin is reluctantly pulled back into his old life, where (surprise!) he was a masterful and skilled martial arts menace. Funny how those skills just come back to you, when the bad guys come for you. Meanwhile, Marvin is still trying to sell a gorgeous home to a lovely (normal) couple.

Rose disrupts Marvin's life, and the lives of everyone else in Alvin's orbit, and there are a lot of exciting and well-done fight scenes, all very creatively done, and some with sly humor as well. Everyone gets knocked around (or worse) before the movie ends, when our star-crossed lovers unite.

## **Checklist: Closing Up Your Home**

Arrange special instructions to gardener, bug guy, pool guy, housekeeper. Store patio furniture in your garage. □ Store outdoor cushions inside. Remove annuals from pots. Turn off and empty water feature. openers. Check exterior vard drains to be sure they are clear for the increased watering in summer. ☐ Make sure outdoor lights are working. □ Make sure batteries in smoke detectors are fresh. Even though you won't be home, others can still hear alarm if there is smoke. Turn down hot water heater, don't forget the casita. Shut off the hot water re-circulating pump. Run water in all sinks: close sink traps. Pour water into bottom of dishwasher so seal will not dry out. Flush toilets, pour toilet cleaner into toilets, close lids.
- Turn off water to house. Turn off gas in fireplace. Turn off gas in barbecue. Turn off ice maker. Unplug electronics. Clean out the refrigerator. Adjust AC to 85, don't forget the casita. Engage locks on cabinet doors if you have them in case of earthquake. Set out large buckets of water in each room. Remove batteries from remotes and put into fridge. Put printer cartridges in ziplock and put into fridge. Put candles and cosmetics in fridge. Remove garage remotes from cars. Lock up all sets of car keys, house keys, garage door Store valuables either in a safe, safe deposit box, or take with you. **Call forward phones.** Turn down the volume on your phone so outsiders cannot hear that it just rings. Take all garbage out. Close blinds. ☐ Make sure doors and windows are locked. Secure slider doors: place piece of pipe in track and engage any additional locks that may have been installed for extra security. Set timers for lights while away.
  - Set alarm.

## What's Cooking?

**Dolce** (Dessert) – The Romans used to say *dulcis in fundo*, meaning 'sweetness at the end' and that's how the custom of eating a *dolce* at the end of the meal came about.

Not many desserts can equal the supreme sweetness of a homemade *Zabaione*. You need just two ingredients plus a touch of a sweet wine like marsala or Porto wine.

#### Zabaione (Serves Four)

#### Ingredients

3 oz (6–7) Organic egg yolks

1 oz sugar

2 oz (<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-cup) Marsala or Porto wine. (I use Porto)

#### Directions

Place a medium-sized bowl filled with ice cubes in the freezer. Pour the wine in a small pot on the stove to warm up (do not boil it!). Place the egg yolks in another bowl. Add half of the sugar in the pot with the wine and the other half with the eggs. Whisk the eggs vigorously, then add a small portion of the warm wine. Place the egg bowl on top of a pot of gently boiling water. Add the rest of the wine and whisk CONTINUOUSLY for one minute or more until the eggs and wine become a thick cream. Transfer the bowl of cream from the pot of boiling water to the top of the bowl of ice and continue whisking for one more minute until the cream has cooled completely.

Serve in a stem bowl with ladyfingers.



*Constellation of the month—Ursa Major:* Third largest constellation. Renowned for its asterism, the *Big Dipper*. An imaginary line from the two bottom dipper stars, Dubhe and Merak (the pointers) points to Polaris, the North Star. Mizar and Alcor, in the handle, form a double star, (a basic test for good eyesight). *Ursa Major* is rich in deep-sky objects: Messier 81, one of the brightest Galaxies, Pinwheel Galaxy, etc. This month the constellation appears to be standing on its handle in the Northwest sky. It is a circumpolar constellation and never sets below the horizon.

*Meteor Shower—Lyrid meteor shower:* April 16–25, 20 meteors per hour at its peak on April 22. Produced by dust particles left behind by comet Thatcher. These meteors can sometimes produce bright dust trails that last for several seconds. Only a thin crescent moon that night, this should be a good show. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Lyra.

Unlimited classes are \$30 monthly; single classes \$5 each; first class is free. Annual membership fee \$25.

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
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
