

Welcome to May! Last month, I outlined our budget process, the impact of all the external items, and how they affect the budget. May 6 will be when the budget is formally adopted. We will send the budget information, along with other disclosures which are required by California law, by the end of the May. As we have requested in the past, if you are still receiving these disclosures via hard copy, there is an option to receive them electronically via email. By opting into email, you not only get the information instantaneously once it is ready and don't have to wait for "snail mail," but you also save the Association time and money!

May 6 is also our Annual Meeting. This year we had four open positions with only the four incumbent directors running. As a result, we were able to elect them by acclimation, which also saves the Association time and money by not having to mail out ballot materials. I am happy to welcome back Randy Dugger, Sue Rogoff, Greg Howser and Tom Liebermann for two more years of service as HOA Board of Directors to Sun City Palm Desert.



Another new item in May is the start of our new HOA Operations Director, Dan Randles. We are thrilled to have Dan joining the team and his first day with us was April 28.

Dan brings over 25 years of leadership experience from a variety of operations, including community associations, golf resorts, hotels and restaurants. Currently serving as the Resort General Manager at Four Seasons at Terra Lago, Dan leads community initiatives, streamlines operations, and ensures owner satisfaction as well as employee engagement.

## FINANCIAL REPORT

THROUGH FEBRUARY 2025



The February 2025 financials were presented to the Finance Committee on Friday, March 28. February finished the month down (\$27K) to budget, \$468K actual vs. \$495K budget.

Golf Shop revenue finished the month up \$33K to budget, \$707K actual vs. \$673K budget. Total golf rounds for February were down

(112); and down (\$22K) for the month. Twilight rounds were down (1,319) rounds and down (\$64K). However, 18-hole and tournament rounds were up 997 and 208 rounds and were up \$33K and \$8K, respectively.

Food & Beverage revenues were down to budget by (\$98K) for the month of February, \$309K actual vs. \$407K budget. Daily Grind was up \$1,511, Catering was up \$1,362, and Boulevards down (\$100K). The Food & Beverage Department did manage their flow-thru of expenses in Boulevards. With revenues being down (\$100K), they decreased \$34K on their

Cost of Sales and \$27K on their salary and wages. Year-to-date Boulevards is down (\$17K) to budget, (\$368K) actual vs (\$351K) budget. Boulevards remains closed on Mondays.

As of March 24, HR had 11 positions on their Open Positions Report. These open positions include three F&B Boulevards positions, three Facilities Maintenance positions and three Golf Course Maintenance positions. There is one applicant in process for the HOA Director position and one applicant in process for the Fitness Monitor position.

There were 16 homes that closed escrow in the month of February. Reserve Replenishment Assessment (RRA) revenues were \$40,032 for February and fiscal year-to-date revenues are \$406,453.50.

Rolling forecasts were prepared this month including eight months actual and four months forecast. Currently, we are on track to make budget for the fiscal year.

Managers continue to review their departmental financials and will look for opportunities to increase revenues and decrease costs.

The Association remains in a sound financial position.

# Board of Directors' Meeting Report · 4-1-25

SUMMARY OF BOARD ACTION ITEMS AND MOTIONS

**25-04-101** – A motion was carried unanimously to approve the purchase and installation of seven new gate barrier arm operators by InterAccess Systems for an amount not to exceed \$79,672, which includes a 10% contingency to be funded by Reserves. This replacement has been sole sourced from InterAccess Systems, our current preferred gate vendor; their pricing aligns with comparable bids received from other vendors in the past.

**25-04-102** – A motion was carried 6 to 1 (Long) to authorize Whitley's Construction to provide labor, materials, and hardware for the interior refurbishment of the Santa Rosa Golf Shop, Lobby and Restrooms for an amount not to exceed \$223,817, including a 10% contingency, to be funded by Reserves. This refurbishment will align with the aesthetic style of the newly renovated Boulevards Restaurant.

**25-04-103** – A motion was carried 6 to 1 (Long) to authorize the purchase of fourteen (14) replacement cardio machines from TechnoGym at a not-to-exceed cost of \$182,894, including a 5% contingency, to be funded by Reserves. This purchase is necessary to replace aging gym equipment and ensure the continued safety, functionality and satisfaction of facility users.

**25-04-104** – A motion was carried unanimously to instruct SCPDCA staff to choose a reliable vendor, Best Buy Restaurant Equipment Supplies, for purchasing the necessary equipment for the Daily Grind/Martini remodel. The purchase should align with the Design Committee's approved plans by Stephen Teeter Design Group. The required equipment for the bar back area amounts to \$66,530.78, with an additional 10% contingency of \$6,653.08, bringing the total project cost to \$73,183.86.






Did you know the LEC is comprised of two committees, the LEC Main and the LEC Subcommittee? This month I will highlight the LEC Main Committee, which is the official decision-making body of the LEC.

The LEC Main is composed of five members and two alternate members. In addition to meeting each Tuesday morning to help in the project reviews, the LEC Main meets two Tuesday afternoons each month to review large or controversial projects and projects involving neighboring properties. In addition to these projects, the Main meetings are the meetings in which homes with violations that are at a hearing stage are discussed. (The hearing is the third and final stage after three letters to the homeowner and 90 days have passed and the violation remains unresolved.)

The LEC Main is also the Committee to recommend any variances from the rules or changes to the rules (The LEC Design Guidelines) to the HOA Board of Directors. This past year the LEC Main recommended new paint colors which were adopted by the Board and implemented on April 1. We will be considering additional changes to the rules in the upcoming months. When considering changes we determine the positive impact on the community as well as operational efficiencies.

In addition to the official meetings, members of the Main Committee meet with homeowners on site for large projects to ensure the application meets the Design Guidelines requirements. They also inspect homes with violations scheduled for a hearing prior to the hearing.

The LEC Main is committed to help homeowners to maintain and upgrade the beauty of this community.

# **Compliance Committee**

#### Ride Along With Us

On a beautiful, sunny afternoon we did a ride-along with Isaac Fernandez, the swing shift supervisor of our SCPD security patrol. Isaac has been at Sun City for eighteen years and his competence, caring and skills are very evident.

First, Isaac took us to the RV lot (a new experience for both of us). The lot is patrolled every shift. Isaac drove around slowly looking for anything that could become a problem. Since the trees and bushes surrounding the RV lot fence have been removed, the lot is far safer to patrol. Nonresidents are allowed to pay and park. Isaac has a list of all names and phone numbers in case he needs to report a problem to an RV owner.

Next, we rode along the outer perimeter of 38th Street to check for unusual activity. Patrol checks all gates every shift to ensure they are working properly and our cards will work, allowing us entry into the shopping center. They also patrol the perimeter of the shopping center which is our outer perimeter in that area. There used to be more activity around the shopping center homes, but all is quiet now, probably because our security patrols are so effective.

Then we rode along Coyote Song Way to check for unusual activity along that perimeter fence. There are usually people out there at night enjoying the stars.

Patrol drives by every home twice each shift, with two shifts a day. Patrol does not carry guns and are not allowed to help anyone who has fallen—that requires a 911 call. If called by a concerned family member or neighbor who cannot locate a resident, patrol will do a welfare check and attempt to contact the resident.

The graveyard shift checks the doors on all three clubhouses. During the day shift, patrol stops in every bathroom to be sure all is okay.

Everything Isaac does is recorded on his phone. In addition, the security patrol body cams record resident stops. Isaac emphasizes customer service over citations. Patrol will try to contact a resident to fix a situation before issuing a citation.

It was an interesting and comforting ride-along, emphasizing another reason why we are so lucky to live in Sun City.

- Install a reputable antivirus and anti-malware program.

#### Phone scam protections include:

- Do not trust Caller ID. Scammers can spoof phone numbers to make it appear as the call is from a trusted source.
- Screen your calls. Let unknown numbers go to voicemail. Genuine callers will leave a message.
- Sign up for the Do Not Call List. Reduce unsolicited telemarking calls by registering your phone number at donotcall.gov.
- Stay updated. Learn about the latest scams by visiting websites like the FTC Scam Alerts page or AARP's Fraud Watch Network.

Remember if you suspect a scam, report it to the FTC or your local authorities immediately. Together we can create a safer community!

# Tune in AM 1620 (\*)

You may have wondered about those signs with the flashing lights that are located in the Del Webb median strip in front of each clubhouse.

Answer: they are part of Sun City's low power radio broadcast station, AM 1620, which alerts you to disaster situations in our Sun City community. When they are flashing, the radio station has been activated. On occasion the lights are tested, such as during the annual practice drills held by the Emergency Preparedness team.

#### What you need to know -

In a disaster, AM 1620 may be the only source of local information available to our residents. It will broadcast items of interest about conditions both within and outside of SCPD. The station will provide up to date information about things like which First Aid stations are activated, are the clubhouses open or closed, status of access gates, where to go to volunteer, how to send a health and welfare message to family outside of the affected area and much more. Live broadcasts that contain current conditions and information will be broadcast regularly as well as selected pre-recorded messages which pertain to the situation.

The signal range of a AM 1620 broadcast is 3 to 5 miles from the transmitter antenna under normal conditions. If a disaster occurs when you are out shopping and you want to get home safely, you can tune in for road and bridge conditions. Good reception was tested at both Costco's, Eisenhower Medical Center and El Paseo shopping area. Remember that the San Andreas fault bisects Interstate 10 to the east and west of us so likely the traffic on it won't be going anywhere for some time.





Think twice before you set out in your car. As mentioned before, Interstate 10 will probably be blocked, the bridges may not be safe and the mountain roads could be dangerous due to slides. The hospitals, already at near capacity, will be setting up triage in their parking lots (if you can get there). The best advice is to be prepared to weather out the chaos with water/other supplies in your car and home.

If there is a major power outage and you want information on what is happening, you are going to need a reliable radio which is battery, solar and/or hand operated. Don't forget to have the extra batteries on hand for it. Your car has a radio, but that option could run down the battery or use up gasoline.



One of the benefits of living in Sun City is that we are the only gated community we know of that has this warning system. The radio broadcast frequency we use is owned by the County of Riverside and we are allowed to operate it under their direction. Our past experience with major power outages has high-lighted the difficulty and the necessity to communicate with our residents, especially the times when power outage impacts our entire community. Lack of accurate knowledge leads people to make faulty decisions and this is the reason why SCPDCA acquired the radio broadcasting station. To keep familiar with it, periodically practice tuning in AM 1620, especially when we hold our practice drills.

# Health & Fitness News

#### Mature Adults and Physical Activity

People tend to become less physically active as they get older. Nearly 40 percent of people over the age of 55 report no leisure-time physical activity. Maintaining or increasing your strength, endurance, balance and flexibility are key factors to staying fit.

The older people become, the more they need regular exercise. It helps prevent bone loss (reducing the risk of fractures) and reduces the risk of dozens of age-associated diseases. It also increases muscle strength, and with proper training improves balance and coordination, reducing the likelihood of falling. Exercise also makes basic tasks easier to do, i.e., carry grocery bags, get up from a chair and take care of household chores. Being physically active is key in maintaining your quality of life and independence.

Studies have shown increased levels of physical activity are associated with a reduced incidence of heart disease, hypertension, non-insulin-dependent Type 2 diabetes, colon cancer, depression and anxiety. Active people with high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes or other chronic diseases are less likely to die prematurely.

Inactive people lose muscle fiber at a rate of about 5% every decade after age 30. This can lead to a 15% loss of muscle fiber by age 60!

Today, gerontologists are discovering age in years does not necessarily correlate with physiological age. In fact, normal physiological aging is quite variable. The difference between your calendar age and your real age results largely from your health behaviors. People who abuse their bodies age at a faster rate. Some people can be ten years older than their calendar age due to smoking, overeating, alcohol consumption and lack of exercise.

Experts warn that a consequence of diminished exercise is a large and increasing number of elderly people who will be living below, at or just above "thresholds of physical ability." In this condition, a minor illness could make them completely dependent on others for their daily care.

#### Exercise Tips for Mature Adults

- Check with your doctor before beginning a new exercise program. It is a good idea to have a physical exam and take a graded exercise test before starting an exercise program.
- Pick repetitive activities challenging the circulatory system, and exercise at an intensity appropriate for you.
- Pick activities you can do year-round.
- Wear comfortable clothing and footwear appropriate for the temperature, humidity and activity.
- If you decide walking is a great activity for you, choose a place with a smooth, soft surface that does not intersect

- with traffic and is well-lit and safe. Many older adults walk at area shopping malls.
- Find a companion to exercise with you if it will help you stay on a regular schedule and add to your enjoyment.
- Because muscular elasticity generally slows with age, take more time to warm up and cool down, and stretch slowly.
- Start exercising at a low intensity (especially if you have been mostly sedentary), and progress gradually.
- If you plan to be active more than 30 minutes, try to drink water with electrolytes every 15 minutes, especially in hot, humid conditions. As you age, your sense of thirst tends to decrease, so you should not rely on your sense of thirst.

# Golf Course NEWS

By Tyler Truman Director of Agronomy and Grounds

Greetings from the Golf Course and Common Area Maintenance team! I'd like to provide you with an update on our Zoysia trials, along with key points and important dates. Over the past year, we've learned a lot from our trials on Hole 11 and Hole 6 at San Gorgonio, and we're excited to share the findings.

#### Key Takeaways from Our Zoysia Trials:

- 1. **Zoysia can be successfully grown in the desert** and be established within 100–120 days.
- 2. **Zoysia can maintain color** during December but may go off-color in January.
- 3. **Zoysia can withstand traffic and divot damage** during the winter and recover without significant impact to play.
- 4. **Zoysia begins to green up** by mid-February.
- 5. **Timely application of dyes and paints** is crucial—it's important not to miss any applications.

#### What's Next for the Zoysia Trials:

- 1. March 18: We began a new trial behind Hole #8 at Santa Rosa. This trial includes two varieties of Zoysia, planted at rates of 400, 600, and 800 bushels. (A bushel is a measurement used to identify the volume of certain materials). The trial consists of three repetitions and another test where the Zoysia is covered in sand.
- 2. **April 15**: We will sprig 1.5 acres with Stadium Zoysia. This trial will allow us to refine our planting techniques, train staff in proper planting methods, and give us the opportunity to test various maintenance methods, use of pigments, and explore water conservation practices.

- 3. **April 15–18**: We will replicate the trial started in mid-March. Additional trials will follow on May 16 and July 8 providing us with valuable data on the best planting rates and ideal planting times for Zoysia.
- 4. **Spring 2026**: With the data gathered from these trials, we plan to carry out a large-scale planting of 15 acres. The location is yet to be determined, and we will seek final approval from the Board. This trial will help us gauge how long it will take to sprig the golf course and other areas of the property. It will also allow us to assess potential savings in maintenance, paint, and fertilizers, giving us a clearer picture of the benefits and challenges of this transition.
- 5. **2026–2028**: After reviewing the results of the above trials, we will make a final decision on whether to proceed with transitioning the property.

We're taking a methodical approach, working closely with universities and the United States Golf Association (USGA). We are dedicated to researching the pros and cons of this transition carefully. You, as residents, will be kept informed through email updates, progress posts, articles in *News & Views*, and presentations that will be held on an annual or semi-annual basis as we move closer to a decision.

- Spectrum is now offering an additional streaming service (Peacock) and the opportunity to get a new receiver box. You may call Spectrum Customer Service 1-833-697-7328 for additional information.
- There have been complaints recently about excessive air traffic noise. It is assumed that this is due to the recent high winds. We should be aware that Sun City is not prohibited airspace, so we can anticipate occasional incursions. Air traffic rules require that planes remain at least 500 feet above our homes.
- The plans for renovations inside the Mountain View and Sunset View Clubhouses will require closing sections of both clubhouses starting in May. The HOA will send out emails with updates on the specific areas being closed.
- The LEC staff will function as normal during the summer, however the LEC Committee meetings will not occur June through September due to renovation work in the clubhouses.
- A recent police swat team incident inside Sun City and the inability to get timely information from law enforcement has raised concerns.
  - The Association does not wish to report second-hand or "unofficial" news.
  - The HOA will look into setting up some sort of "push" notification to residents about serious incidents of concern in the community.
  - The individual sought at the time by law enforcement is currently being held without bail.
- It is possible to discontinue Burrtec charges if you plan to be gone over the summer. You will need to contact Burrtec directly at 760-340-2113 to cancel for the summer, and then you must call again to restart the service when you return.
- A new storage unit will be added to the east side of the Mountain View Clubhouse in order to free up storage areas inside the facility.
- The Golf Course Maintenance Building's solar system is the first of (hopefully) many solar projects to reach completion with all sign offs by the county and IID completed. It is currently producing electricity.
- After Easter the staff will be replacing the winter color plant palate with summer plantings.
- During the clubhouse renovations, please do not try to return or donate books to the SCPD library. There will be no one there to receive them until the library reopens.

# Clubhouse Cosmetic Facelifts Unveiled

As news about the upcoming Mountain View and Sunset View Clubhouses remodeling spreads, questions from concerned residents started rising. In an effort to address residents' concerns, I sat down with Clint Atherton, our General Manager, for a brief interview and addressed the following:

#### I. Project Background

A couple of years ago, the Strategic Planning Committee formed a focus group which conducted a survey on improvements and renovations that the residents would like to see. This renovation is a result of that survey.


Added to this survey, many of the common areas in our community still have the original furniture and furnishings dating back to about 1999–2000. A "cosmetic facelift" is necessary to freshen up our look.

To help with the design, an interior designer was hired. HOA staff attended the meetings with the designer. A committee composed of residents decided on the design which was presented to the Board for final approval. A local construction company was hired for this project.

#### II. Project Timeline

The renovations are scheduled to start on May 1 through September 30, 2025. Although there is never a good time to undertake such a huge project, these dates were chosen because of the low occupancy in the community during those months. The projected remodeling schedule in phases is as follows...

#### III. Scope of Project

Clint would like to emphasize that the renovation is purely aesthetic/cosmetic. Other than a small interior wall in the Ventana room, no walls will be moved; no rooms will be reconfigured. Walls will be repainted, some flooring will be replaced, some refinished. All furniture will be replaced. Clint looked into refurbishing our current furniture but was surprised to find out that refurbishing was more costly than replacing them.

#### IV. Accessibility of Club/HOA Rooms

Because most of the renovations will occur in hallways, many of the club/HOA rooms will be accessible most of the time. Specific rooms may be closed at certain times for safety reasons. The HOA will communicate these closures ahead of time via eblasts and signage.

#### V. Funding


This project will be funded through our reserves. "The project only impacts our percent funded for our reserve study by approximately one percent. The HOA fees will not go up as a result of this project," Clint said.

#### VI. Common Area Renovations

**A.** LIBRARY | The walls and ceiling will be painted, fireplace will be refaced with both sides remaining open, floor will be replaced. The bookcases will not be touched.



**B. VENTANA** | Of all the common areas, Ventana will incur the most renovations both for aesthetics and functionality reasons. To create more room, one portion of the interior wall will be pushed back about four feet. Storage for audio equipment will be created; the walls will be painted; new lighting will be installed; the ceiling will be leveled and finished off with materials that will improve the acoustics in the room; and the floor will be replaced.



**C. MARTINI'S AND DAILY GRIND** | The plan for Martini's and Daily Grind is to provide more offerings on their menu. As such, the furniture in the room will be replaced to accommodate more seating, the floor will be replaced, and the walls will be painted. The bar area will be spruced up but the structure will remain the same.



- **D. SPEAKERS HALL** | The chairs, flooring and lighting will be replaced. The walls will be painted. The physical structure of the stage will remain.
- E. SIERRA BALLROOM | The dance floor will be refinished, carpeting replaced, walls will be painted.



Hopefully this information helps clarify many of your concerns. Just like remodeling our own homes, many of us are anxious and skeptical. But once the remodeling is complete, we will take deep breaths of relief, enjoy the "new look," and go on with our lives...until the next "facelift."

# Farewell and Aloha to Dean Lining

Dean Lining, a friendly and familiar presence around Sun City's front desk for as long as many of us can remember, has retired after 24 years of what he calls one of the most "extraordinary, rewarding and wonderful experiences of my life." He has made hundreds of friends over these many years, and those who know him, have been rewarded and well-served by his cheerful personality and willingness to help all of us with our big problems and small nuisances with positive energy, a smile and a hug. One always feels a little better after a pleasant conversation with Dean.

Dean started working for Del Webb Sun City in August 2001 at their Customer Service Warranty desk on Wildcat Street, across from the main entrance to this exciting new community, where new residents would pick up garage remotes and keys and report any problems. He then moved to the community's first clubhouse, Mountain View, and worked at the Front/Main Desk as a customer service assistant. He was in constant contact with new residents, prospective home buyers and other staff regarding amenities available to residents and the many choices for lifestyle activities being offered to everyone. He provided updates on the availability of new homes with the continual expansion of new sections, and the ongoing additional amenities residents and their guests could look forward to enjoying. Dean developed congenial relationships with new homeowners and helped them with questions regarding their property. Dean eventually became the Resident Services supervisor for the two employees who make up the front desk staff.

Prior to Sun City, Dean led quite an adventuresome life. He was born and raised in Honolulu and was the second-born of four brothers. He grew up in a musical household, learning to play the ukulele at a young age. By his late teens, he decided to join the Merchant Marines. The Merchant Marines operate under the jurisdiction of the Coast Guard. He was accepted and sent to school in Piney Point, Maryland. To earn his "Z" card certification, Dean trained and excelled at firefighting, first aid, and lifeboat operations. For the next ten years, Dean travelled the world on American and foreign flagship cruise liners. He was a cabin steward

for about seven years, and spent his last three years as an entertainer, putting to good use his musical gifts, including playing the ukulele and singing a wide repertoire of Hawaiian songs. While working on cruise ships, he rose in the seniority rotation ranks, working for three months, then having one month off.

Dean decided to move on to American Express Travel Related Services, where he settled in for the next ten years. He was proficient in customer service for all types of travelers and visited many more countries and ports of call in his travels for the company. When Dean had time off from working on cruise lines and American Express, he would find temporary employment with the Disney Company as an entertainer and, over the years, has worked at many different Disney parks including the ones in Japan, Anaheim and Florida. When the AmEx travel business began to downsize, a friend suggested that Dean come to the California desert to look for his next adventure. Dean had visited the Coachella Valley before and really enjoyed it. It was then that he found employment with the Del Webb organization where he spent the next 24 "truly wonderful" years.

During our interview, Dean gave me a quick and fun lesson in the Hawaiian language. Interestingly, the ukulele is not of Hawaiian origin but is actually a Portuguese instrument that Hawaii adopted as its own hundreds of years ago. When first hearing the *ukulele* played, a Hawaiian king named it "uku" meaning "flea" and "lele" meaning "jump." Also, *Waikiki* comes from "wai" (water) and "kiki" (sprouting). As Dean and I ended our interview, I was delighted when he got out his ukulele and serenaded me with a lovely tune (*Lahaina Luna*). I closed my eyes and reminisced about my own many wonderful visits to Hawaii.

# From Canvas to Chrome: The Shared Craft of Art and Car Restoration

In the world of restoration, those involved agree it can be a challenging, engrossing and ultimately satisfying world.

Whether restoring a classic car to its former gleaming chrome and brilliantly painted glory, or uncovering original details, colors and textures hidden by the accumulation of years of neglect and discoloration in an artwork, restoration is a blend of knowledge of both science and art. It's a labor of love requiring skill, precision and perseverance.

Art and car restoration reflect the passion and interest of the restorer, requiring much patience and the ability to see the potential in the object being restored. Where others might see a dirty, damaged canvas or sculpture, or an old brokendown, rusted wreck of a forgotten car, the restorer can envision the possibilities.

Why are vintage cars and artworks worth restoring? Restoration of objects from the past is a rich source of knowledge about craftsmanship, history and the importance of preservation of the finest objects and workmanship of past generations. Placing these objects into historical context tells us much about their respective eras and about what people valued. The shared goal of restoration is preserving history and beauty while noting the differences in materials and techniques.

Art conservationists spend years learning the techniques to perfect their craft. They have a strong science background, particularly in chemistry, as well as an extensive knowledge of art history. Restorers must imagine the world of the artist—the artist's emotions and perspective—to make certain the restoration complies with the artist's original intent. Every artwork tells a story; it is a look into the artist's mind, culture, time and emotions.

Restoration techniques for artworks focus on painstakingly meticulous cleaning, particularly of old varnishes, repairing and stabilizing materials often using advanced scientific methods and pigment analysis.

In restoring vintage cars, the focus is on mechanical repairs, bodywork and sourcing original parts. Ethical considerations also play into it. Does the restorer attempt strict originality when confronted with the difficulties of finding rare car parts, or modernize and alter for functionality?

It will all depend on the car's intended use. Will it be used for cruising on the street? Will it be sold to a collector or museum? Will it only be trailered around to car shows and exhibits?

Each restored car carries a story of its own. It's original manufacturing era, previous owners and provenance, and the



unique choices made during restoration. The car restorer builds a wealth of knowledge about mechanical engineering, design and materials to breathe new life and energy into classic vehicles. These magicians are able to envision how a dilapidated hunk of metal can transform into a sleek, showstopping masterpiece.

In both art and car restoration, tools are carefully chosen to ensure the objects are treated with the respect they deserve. Many of the tools are similar; soft brushes and cloths, solvents, cleaning agents, adhesives, specialized lighting for accurate color matching, UV lights to detect previous restorations or hidden damages, tools for smoothing and reshaping. Car restoration tools might also include engine hoists, dual-action sanders, spray guns for high-quality paint jobs, grinders, torque wrenches, drills and drill bits and many more.

Sometimes what is involved in car and art restoration is not quite a DIY job. Fortunately, there is always help available. Magazines, websites, videos, car clubs, automotive museums, car shows and auctions all offer advice and exchange information with other knowledgeable restorers and car experts.

Classic car restorers and art conservators share many aspects. Attention to detail is important; both require meticulous care whether it's perfecting brushstrokes or reconstructing intricate engine components. There is a sense of preserving history. Just as art often reflects a moment in time, restored cars represent a piece of automotive history and cultural heritage. A certain painting of a familiar or well-loved scene; a favorite make and model of a vintage car that brings to mind fond memories—nostalgia can be an emotional trigger setting one on the restoration path.

They share a sense of personal expression because artists convey emotion and vision through their work. An art restorer's job is to bring back to light what had become hidden through neglect and in doing so inspire a new generation of viewers. Those who love to restore vintage cars express personality through choices in paint, trim and performance modification.

A restored classic car is as truly a work of art as the finest painting or sculpture. We are fortunate there are so many museums and venues where both are displayed for viewers to admire and dream.

Not exactly a fashion statement, these devices may not look cool, but they can certainly keep you cool in the summer months. With many brands to choose from, here are a few: Gulaki, Hotsales, and Egopp.

#### **Personal Fans**

If the idea of hanging a fan around your neck isn't for you, a handheld fan might be a better option. These small, battery-powered fans are compact and lightweight. Some models offer digital readouts showing the device speed and battery life. Others fold down to just a few inches and easily slip into a purse. Some models can be slung around your neck with a lanyard or rest on a desk for hands-free use.

These portable fans are perfect for concerts, weddings, picnics, outdoor shopping, or (if you dare!) waiting in long lines in Disneyland.

Available in a variety of colors, brands include Jiuslife, Gaiatop, and HandFan.

#### **Cooling Bracelets**

These wrist devices emit cooling bursts to thermoreceptors—sensitive nerves on the inside of the wrist—which send icy signals to the brain, in essence tricking it to feel cooler than you are. While effectiveness varies by user, many



people, especially those experiencing hot flashes, report positive results.

Rechargeable models tend to be pricey, while more affordable versions can be placed in the freezer before use. Brands include Embr Wave, Hot Girls Pearls, and Sharper Image.

Could cooling bracelets become the next must-have accessory for full timers in the desert?



#### **Cooling Hats**

A wide-brimmed hat with UPF 50+ protects your face and scalp from the sun, but some interesting designs go a step further. Options include:

- Moisture-wicking materials that absorb sweat and heat away from the skin toward the outer surface of the hat. (Clothing made of similar fabrics provides a cooling effect, too.)
- Solar-powered hats, with small solar panels on the brim, that use the sun to generate built-in fans that direct airflow to your face.
- Gel-infused or ice-pocket hats that provide prolonged cooling.
- "Wet-to-cool" hats that stay cool for hours after being soaked in water, using evaporation to draw heat away from your skin.

#### **Cooling Scarves & Towels**

These accessories are made of special fabrics or waterabsorbing material. After being soaked in water, they swell up. As they dry against your skin, the absorbed water slowly evaporates, creating a cooling sensation. Available in many colors and styles, cooling scarves and towels are great for golf, hiking, and walking. Your dog will appreciate a wet scarf, too.

#### **Mattress Cooling Pad**

At last, a solution for hot sleepers and those who experience night sweats! Just as there are thermal blankets to keep you warm in winter, specialized mattress pads cool your body while you sleep.

Different models use various technologies:

- Gel-infused foam draws heat away from the body.
- Foam or microcoils pads promote airflow and reduce heat retention.
- Electronic bed pads (though more expensive) allow you to set the temperature you desire.

A mattress cooling pad can help you sleep better, reduce your reliance on air conditioning, and even accommodate different temperature preferences if you and your partner sleep at different levels of warmth. Cooling pillows are also available for added comfort.

With so many innovative cooling products available, staying comfortable in the heat may just get a bit easier.

He finished. He waited. Then, like waves of love, the applause washed over him, every bit as fabulous as the laughter that inspired it.


After his bows, backstage, his fellow performers shook his hand, slapped his back, shouted congratulations. They knew what it took. And now he knew.


**1962** – *The Tonight Show*. On October 1, Johnny Carson became the host. His first guests were Joan Crawford and Rudy Vallee.

## What's Cooking?

One of my all-time favorite pasta dishes is *Spaghetti all' Amatriciana*. (Amatrice is a mountain town north of Rome, famous for its pork meats.) As I learned it from my mom, she would assemble the ingredients and, in what magically looked like an instant, I soon had the fragrant aroma of the spicy sauce tickling my senses.

## Spaghetti all'Amatriciana (Serves Four)

#### **Ingredients**

10-12 oz Spaghetti

5–6 oz Pancetta (or thick-cut bacon), cut into small strips 24 oz Whole Peeled Tomatoes (canned or fresh)

½ cup White Wine

1 Peperoncino Red Pepper, sliced


3 oz Pecorino Romano, freshly grated

1 small/medium Onion, cut in half and sliced lengthwise Salt

#### **Directions**

Put a pot of water on the stove to boil the spaghetti. In a large frying pan, cook the pancetta over a low flame until they are crackling golden brown. Raise the flame, add the wine and let it evaporate. Remove the pancetta from the pan, but *don't discard the oil* (it's the crucial flavor). Sauté the onion in the pan for 5 minutes or until lightly golden. Pour in the peeled tomatoes and break them into chunks. Add the red pepper. Cook for 15 minutes, stirring occassionally. Salt to taste. *Remove the red pepper from the sauce* and add the pancetta. When the water is boiling, add salt to taste and cook the spaghetti "al dente" (about 11 minutes). Drain the spaghetti and add to the sauce. As you stir and turn the noodles, add the Romano, leaving some for the individual portions.

Enjoy my favorite Roman pasta dish!



Starring Robert DiNiro and Debra Messing

Okay, first, the title is awful and stirs little interest. Robert DiNiro stars in dual roles as real-life Italian mobsters Vito Genovese and Frank Costello. Their entwined history as budding criminals in early 20th century New York's Little Italy, their subsequent years-long separation, and ultimately disastrous reunion is the crux of the fairly straightforward storyline, narrated by a detached, unemotional Costello.


The film begins in the 1950s and depicts a suave Costello and his wife (wonderfully portrayed by Debra Messing) at New York's Copacabana nightclub, enjoying a performance by Louis Prima and Keely Smith. The film intersperses real footage of the singers, giving it a realistic "you-are-there" vibe. Costello sends his wife off with friends while he stops at their Park Avenue apartment for some business. When he enters the lobby, a guy approaches, calls out his name and shoots him, grazing the side of his head. He lives but is sure this "message" is from his old friend/now enemy, Vito. Vito is furious to learn Costello did not die.

As Costello relates in his narrative, they were great friends and partners in racketeering and other criminal activities, until hotheaded Vito murders someone in front of witnesses, and flees the country, going to Italy to escape imprisonment. Costello and Vito agree that if/when Vito returns, he can resume control of half their mutual mob businesses.

But years have passed and the mob business is conducted in a vastly different, and quieter, way. Costello patiently explains this to Vito. But Vito, impatient and brimming with resentment and suspicion, believes Costello wants to cut him out and plans the unsuccessful assassination attempt. He then has Costello's righthand man, Albert Anastasia, brutally murdered while getting a shave at a barber shop. The movie interjects actual photos of this infamous moment. Costello (infinitely smarter than Vito) realizes he needs to get rid of Vito once and for all. He hatches a Machiavellian plan to have Vito and dozens of other mobsters caught at the big meeting in Apalachin, New York in 1957, which made national news headlines. Costello died peacefully years later.

Critics were lukewarm about the movie, calling it mostly a retread, but I enjoyed it. These were real life gangsters and real-life consequences.

#### The Drowned By John Banville

Booker winner for *The Sea*, Banville's latest is a psychological procedural set in 1950s Ireland.

The beginning is eerie: "He had lived alone for so long, so far away from the world and its endless swarms of people, that when he saw the strange thing standing at a slight list in the middle of the field below the house, for a second he didn't know what it was. But it wasn't an animal, it was a motorcar."

Wymes finds a Mercedes in a field on Ireland's southeast coast. A man walks over the hill and tells Wymes his wife got out of the car and may have just drowned herself. Wymes and the man seek help at a cottage nearby and eventually DI St. John Strafford is sent from Dublin to investigate. Strafford thinks the whole affair has an unreality about it. Everyone seems to have something to hide.

Banville is possibly more concerned with the emotional life of Strafford and Quirke, the forensic pathologist, than he is with the mystery. Quirke is grief-stricken by the death of his wife. Strafford is separated, his wife has asked for a divorce, and his girlfriend who is Quirke's daughter, is pregnant. The novel's unhurried pace picks up after a second disappearance.

#### Three Days in June By Ann Tyler

Pulitzer winner Tyler's latest is only 150 pages and opens with her main character Gail, age 61, expecting to be promoted to the head of a girl's school. Her boss tells her, "Face it: this job is a matter of people skills. You know that. And surely, you'll be the first to admit that social interactions have never been your strong point. You need to avoid saying things like 'Good God, Mrs. Morris, surely you realize your daughter doesn't have the slightest chance of getting into Princeton."

This occurs the same week that Gail's daughter Debbie is getting married, and Gail's life becomes more fraught when her ex-husband Max arrives, wanting to stay with her. Max has a cat Debbie's fiancé is allergic to, and Max can't stay with them as planned.

"Max has no boundaries. Gail is all about boundaries."

The real crisis begins when Debbie tells them a secret she just learned about her fiancé.

The book is structured around the three days of the wedding: *Day of Beauty*, *D-Day*, and *The Day After*.

Second largest constellation; Hydra is the largest. Brightest star is Spica. The "Virgo supermassive black hole" refers to the black hole at the center of the M87 galaxy, a giant in the Virgo constellation. Virgo galaxy cluster contains trillions of stars, globular clusters and familiar Messier objects, i.e., Sombrero Galaxy. M87 is the first black hole imaged by the Event Horizon Telescope. It is the most powerful known source of radio



energy in the Virgo Cluster. Two meteor showers associated with the constellation: Virginids and Mu Virginids.

Meteor Showers:

- Eta Aquarids shower: Peak on May 3 4 originating from Halley's Comet, up to 30 meteors per hour, pre-dawn hours. Radiant point: constellation Aquarius, spectacular in the Southern Hemisphere.
