Executive Update

Heading into June, we leave behind May which marked a busy time for the Association staff and volunteers. Our staff can finally exhale as their budgets have been completed and are now approved. Our senior managers and finance team did an outstanding job working tightly with our Finance Committee and the Board of Directors.

The budget approval, however, does not mean the process is over. Our finance and admin teams then put together the annual disclosure package. This package must be sent out at least 30 days prior to the start of fiscal year which begins on July 1. This annual disclosure consists of a summary of our operating budget and reserve study. It also includes information regarding our insurance coverage, architectural guidelines, and enforcement policies among many other things. With so much information this packet can range from 60-80 pages. We do have the option of emailing this information as opposed to sending it via US Mail, but *every* member per California law must be sent this annual disclosure.

To receive the information electronically, an owner must "opt in" via writing. Currently we have only 1,700 owners opted in for electronic delivery. That means that we must mail out hard copy of this information to 3,285 owners! At 60 pages per packet, that is 197,100 copies we must make, stuff into envelopes and mail. A packet about that size with postage costs the Association just under \$20,000 to mail. This \$20,000 does not include all the staff and volunteer time it takes to make copies and stuff envelopes (not to mention the numerous paper cuts to go along with it).

In addition, we also have a smaller mailing that is required by California law in October which consists of our audited financials from the end of our fiscal year in June. Although this mailing is much smaller, it still will cost the Association over \$10,000 to mail it out to owners.

As you have gathered from reading the above, these required mailings cost the Association over \$30,000 annually, and with the price of postage and paper increasing, it will only go up in the future unless we can get more owners to opt in for electronic delivery. I hope by now you are asking yourself, "Am I already opted in?" or "How do I check?" or "I know I am not, but how can I opt in for electronic delivery?" Although by the time you read this it will be too late to receive the 2025 annual disclosure electronically, we can set you up for all future required mailings and help save the Association big \$\$\$\$\$. If you have not already done so, please fill out and submit the two-page Address Verification form (a.k.a., "opt in" form) on pages 11–12 of this June issue.

Board of Directors' Meeting Report · 5-6-25

SUMMARY OF BOARD ACTION ITEMS AND MOTIONS

25-05-100 – A motion was unanimously carried to authorize Guralnick & Gilliland, Attorneys at Law, to execute and record an assessment lien on the following properties: #404072, #304387, #304173. **25-05-101** – A motion was unanimously carried to approve the revised bylaws for the Performing Arts Club, a Sun City Palm Desert Charter Club.

25-05-102 – A motion was unanimously carried to approve the purchase and installation of an 18' x 32' modular storage building at a cost not to exceed \$174,771. This includes a 10% contingency and will be funded through Accumulated Surplus. **25-05-103** – A motion was carried 6 to 1 (Long) to approve the purchase and installation of a permanent flagpole, field sign, announcer's booth, and 6' fence with 11' warning track and foul poles for the softball field at a cost not to exceed \$34,349. This includes a 10% contingency to be funded by Accumulated Funds.

25-05-104 -A motion was carried 6 to 1 (Rheuban) to authorize the purchase and installation of audio and video equipment in Ventana and Daily Grind/Martini's for an amount of \$131,791.71, plus a 5% contingency of \$6,952.22 for a total of \$138,743.93 to be paid from Replacement Reserves.

25-05-105 – A motion was unanimously carried to approve the purchase of two (2) ice machines for \$18.097.92 from RSD

(Refrigerated Supplies Distributor) to be paid from Replacement Reserves.

25-05-106 – A motion was unanimously carried to instruct staff to choose Best Buy Restaurant Equipment Supplies for purchasing the necessary equipment for the Daily Grind/Martini remodel at a cost of \$19,617.99 with an additional 10% contingency of \$1,961.80, bringing the total project cost to \$21,579.79.

25-05-107 – A motion was unanimously carried to authorize a new three (3) year agreement with Xpress Graphics Printing Company to produce the monthly News & Views magazine for the annual cost of \$144,569.16. This includes production, paper cost and shipping, based on a 96page publication.

25-05-108 – A motion was unanimously carried to disclose the authorization of a change order related to the shipment of the battery systems and inverters for the solar project BAI# 23-09-107 due to newly imposed tariffs on this equipment being delivered from China. To keep the project on schedule and ensure continued progress an emergency executive session was convened, and the Board approved a not-to-exceed amount of \$168,000, to be funded from Accumulated Surplus to cover these additional tariff-related expenses. This amount will be reduced by 22% based on our contract with Collective Sun for a total cost to the Association of \$131,040.

FINANCIAL REPORT

THROUGH MARCH 2025



The March 2025 financials were presented to the Finance Committee on Friday, May 2. March finished the month up \$25K to budget, \$483K actual vs. \$458K budget. Golf Shop revenue finished the month up \$40K to budget, \$718K actual vs. \$677K budget. Total golf rounds for March are up 616; and are up \$22K for the month.

Twilight Rounds are down (509) rounds and down (\$27K). However, 18-Hole and Tournament Rounds are up 875 and 345 and up \$34K and \$16K, respectively.

Food & Beverage revenues are down to budget by (\$61K) for the month of March, \$349K actual vs. \$409K budget. Daily Grind is up \$2K; Catering is up \$28K; and Boulevards is down (\$91K).

The Food & Beverage department did manage their flowthru of expenses in Boulevards. With revenues being down (\$91K), they decreased \$32K on their Cost of Sales and \$20K on their salary and wages. Year-to-date Boulevards profit & loss is down (\$59K) to budget. Boulevards remains closed on Mondays.

As of May 1, HR has 7 positions on their Open Positions Report. These open positions include one F&B Boulevards position, three Facilities Maintenance positions and three Golf Course Maintenance positions.

There were 31 homes that closed escrow in the month of March. Reserve Replenishment Assessment (RRA) Revenues are \$70,221 for March and fiscal year-to-date revenues are \$476,674.50.

Rolling forecasts were prepared this month including nine months actual and thre months forecast. Currently, we are on track to make budget for the fiscal year.

Managers continue to review their departmental financials and will look for opportunities to increase revenues and decrease costs.

The Association remains in a sound financial position.

- Drink plenty of water. Your body needs water to keep cool. Drink plenty of fluids even if you do not feel thirsty.
- Do not get too much sun. Sunburn reduces your body's ability to dissipate heat.

Heat disorder symptoms to look for:

- Sunburn: Redness and pain. In severe cases swelling, blisters, fever and headaches.
- Heat Cramps: Painful spasms usually in the muscles of legs and abdomen with heavy sweating.
- Heat Exhaustion: Sweating; weakness; cold, pale, clammy skin; thready pulse; fainting; vomiting; may have normal temperature.
 Seek medical attention if needed.
- Heat Stroke: Body temperature of 106° or higher; hot dry skin; rapid, strong pulse; possible unconsciousness. Seek medical attention IMMEDIATELY!

By taking care of our bodies while we are in the heat, we can avoid becoming a heatrelated victim. Stay safe.

Garage Doors

Garage doors must always remain closed, except while working in the garage. The garage door may be partially open 1–2 feet during summer months for ventilation.



2025 Annual Meeting Report

We continue to attract a Zoom audience averaging 15 residents; our average live audience consisting of five "regulars." Since COVID, residents prefer attending via Zoom.

We introduced you to three members of our staff: Brian Locke, our new IT Communications Director; Julie Pope, our new Activities Coordinator; and Armann Rohde, our Finance Director. Each addressed the challenges they face and projects on their horizon.

Senior Managers and Committee Chairs briefed the Council on projects impacting Sun City:

- The new QR code gate entry system, CVWD's main waterline replacement project, the North Channel clean-up, and our dog parks.
- Revised Guest Card program, softball field upgrades, and fitness classes under consideration.
- Updates on EPC training exercises and programs, response to community emergencies, and presentations, e.g., turning off utilities in emergencies.
- The new exterior paint schemes, how "watch homes" are monitored by the LEC, and other LEC operations.

The Riverside County Transportation Commission briefed us on the Valley's 2024 Traffic Relief Plan, focusing on its impact on Sun City.

Committee liaisons kept you current on emerging issues of concern:

- LEC activity relative to violations, inspections and projects.
- CMAC sponsored programs (e.g., the Community EXPO, Halloween Party, Speaker Series, Cinco de Mayo, and Active Adult Health Fair), community dances and concerts.
- EPC's training programs, health-related seminars, and the results and lessons learned from different exercises.
- Fitness & Recreation status reports of equipment needs from various clubs and consideration of new health-related fitness classes.
- Erik's quarterly resident meetings, items under discussion by the Public Safety Committee, data on traffic violations, and studies undertaken to enhance safety.
- The Strategic Planning Committee's on-going review of accomplishments, prioritized recommendations for Board approval, and on-going monitoring of objectives set in the Plan.

We continually address your concerns to the Board, i.e., speed monitors and cameras, street conditions, white lines on Del Webb, the need for more ADA parking spaces, and the status of our solar project. You name it; we raised it! Our meetings provided the forum to gain the Board's attention and interact on your behalf.

We successfully continue our mission: listening to you and carrying forward your concerns. All in all, a good year.

Per the DEA Diversion Investigator, Gillian Hadland, SCPDCA collected a total of 32 boxes, or 393 pounds, that would have otherwise been improperly discarded. That is almost 400 pounds of reclaimed meds that will not end up in our ground water. Sun City HOA would like to thank everyone for their attendance and for bringing their expired and or unused meds in...we look forward to hosting yet another event in the fall.




All California rules of the road apply to golf carts. This means drivers must stop at all stop signs, signal when turning, and obey all other traffic laws. Treating the golf cart with the same respect and caution as you would any other vehicle is important.

Children often enjoy riding in golf carts, but it is essential to remember that a golf cart is not a toy. Passengers should remain seated at all times and the cart should not be overloaded with more passengers than there are seats. Overloading the cart can lead to accidents and injuries, so always ensure everyone is seated properly.

When driving a golf cart, use the designated golf cart lanes whenever they are available. These lanes are designed to keep golf carts safe and separate from larger, faster-moving vehicles. If you need to make a left turn, safely transition out of the golf cart lane and signal your intention to other drivers. Stay to the right whenever possible on residential streets to allow cars and trucks to pass easily.

Lastly, it is essential to remember that cars and trucks are heavier and faster than golf carts. In the event of a collision, the golf cart is at a significant disadvantage. Always be aware of your surroundings, drive defensively, and prioritize safety to avoid accidents.



Why We Practice

Practice is the cornerstone of learning and skill development. It leads to better performance, gaining confidence in one's abilities and learning from our mistakes. This April several of our EPC teams put this concept to work.



SEARCH & RESCUE, April 14

In case of a disaster, the first assignment of the Search & Rescue (S&R) Team is to evacuate the three clubhouses. Each clubhouse has nooks and corners that need to be checked for fire hazards, gas leaks or persons who might be trapped or injured. Residents and personnel need to be evacuated outside. Teams maintain radio contact with the Emergency Operations Center (EOC). Nine S&R and three EOC Radio team members participated. Our thanks to the residents for their cooperation during these practice drills and the HOA Emergency Response Teams.

If you routinely spend time in one of the clubhouses, you should know where to exit in case of an emergency. Did you know Mountain View Clubhouse has two fire doors which automatically close off various areas and this affects the exit routes available? One is positioned between the glass studio and the computer tech lab. The other is by the main lobby entrance, near the restrooms.

Adding interest to the planned drill was a real magnitude 5.2 earthquake that occurred near Julian and was felt here. The Elsinore is one of the largest faults in southern California (190 miles long through San Diego County and dividing into the Chino and Whittier faults at Los Angeles). Historically it is one of the quietest faults, however, it is capable of producing a magnitude 7.8 earthquake.

HAM RADIO, April 18

This was World Amateur Radio Day. Our HAM team took part by sending messages from our residents to their designated out-of-state email address via Winlink Global Radio Email. This system, designed for disasters which involve large numbers of people, is faster than one HAM radio operator calling to another and is able to operate without the Internet.

The team also talked to Sonoma (CA), Michigan and England on digital mobile radio. They joined the Coachella Valley Amateur Radio Emergency Service's test exercise and advised them of the status of Sun City Palm Desert.

We plan to practice this exercise again and encourage you take part by sending a message to your out-of-state contact.

Lifestyle Changes for Lasting Results

No matter what time of year you decide to eat better, exercise more, or be less stressed, it can be hard to make a lifestyle change, and even harder to make it stick. Experts say efforts to change are more likely to produce results if they are SMART, that is Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, and Time-based. If you're thinking of making a change, see if your goal can pass the SMART test:

- 1. Set a very **specific** goal. For example: I will add one fruit serving that's half a cup, chopped to my current daily diet.
- 2. Find a way to **measure** progress. For example, I will log my efforts each day on my calendar.
- 3. Make sure it's **achievable**. For example, don't set a goal of a daily 5 mile run if you're out of shape. If you can't safely or reasonably accomplish your goal, set a smaller, achievable one.
- 4. Make sure it's **realistic**. It may seem counterintuitive but choosing the change you most need to make let's say, quitting smoking or losing weight may not be as successful as choosing the change you're most confident you'll be able to make. Focus on sure bets: if you picture a 10-point scale of confidence in achieving your goal, where 1 equals no confidence and 10 equals 100% certainty, your goal should land in the 7-to-10 zone. For instance, one additional fruit serving a day is a small, manageable step toward better health.
- 5. Set **time** commitments. Pick a date and time to start. For example, Wednesday at breakfast, I'll add frozen blueberries to my cereal. Pick regular check-in dates: I'll check my log every week and decide if I should make any changes in my routines to succeed. Find an outside deadline that will help keep you motivated.

Golf Shop NEWS

Is June a good time to play golf? Well, let us see! The average morning temperature is between 70–75 degrees Fahrenheit. The midday average temperature hits an average high of 104 degrees. The cost for a resident to play golf is \$51 dollars and if you have any Rate Lock at all, the cost is a whopping \$30 bucks. So yes, I would say June is a great time to play golf. All you need is a Yeti, floppy hat and UPF 50.

Do Canadian geese actually fly back to Canada? Yes, most do. It would take a Canadian goose approximately three weeks to fly from Palm Springs to Canada. 

- We are beginning upgrades to our Fitness Centers.
 - Each facility has received five new TechnoGym treadmills.
 - The old treadmills, some with over 20,000 miles on them, were donated to the Riverside County Fire Department.
 - You must have your resident ID or guest card to enter the Fitness Centers. In order to keep outsiders from taking advantage of our facilities the ID must be physically presented when entering.
- Summer RFID hours will be 8:30 11 a.m. to avoid summer heat. The front desk will be issuing RFIDs.
- The LEC will use Dean Lining's old office. It will be manned from 8:30-11 a.m. and from 1:30-3 p.m. It will be closed on Tuesdays.
 - The LEC currently consists of five staff members and 20+ volunteers.
 - The LEC is working on updating the design guidelines to better match modern trends and provide more design flexibility.
- Our security company, Vintage, has been bought by Titanium Security. The HOA has entered into a three-year contract with Titanium. The staff will remain the same.
- The Library will be closed in June for remodeling and will remain closed until the hallway to the entrance has been finished, perhaps by August. Please hold all books or other items until the library reopens.
- The Daily Grind will be closed for remodeling beginning June 9. While the Daily Grind is closed, coffee and pastries will be available at Boulevards in the private dining room near the Billiards room. The rest of Boulevards won't be open until lunch service.
- The Solar Project continues to move along.
 - Trenching in the parking lots has been completed. The batteries and transformers needed for the project have arrived from China.
 - The HOA has received help from our suppliers, contractors and our partner on covering the unexpected costs of tariffs on these items. We could not order the batteries and transformers until we completed the inspections and approvals from IID, and then the county. Once the specific requirements for each clubhouse were approved, we were able to order the items. The order was placed eight months ago.
 - The concrete pads for the batteries will be poured at the Lake View and Sunset View Clubhouses. Underground electrical work will affect the Mountain View parking lot.
- CVWD will begin the next segment of the eight-inch main line in late September.
 - This will affect travel on Ryans Way and Golden Reed in Districts 6 and 7.
 - When completed, as part of an extensive pavement management plan for SCPDCA, the streets will be repaved.
 - Under the plan the rest of Sun City will also begin to receive fresh asphalt because it may be several years before CVWD has funds for the installation of another segment of eight-inch main line.
- We should all review our new Go Access accounts to make certain that all approved visitor information is current. And, if you haven't already transferred to the new app, you should do it now.

But looking at the stagnant world around me, I knew my answer. "Deal."



I respond, "Why me? I'm truly unremarkable. Few even remember me or anything I've done in my long life."



Sylvia also has plenty of momisms and grammy-isms such as, "Always learn from mistakes and keep your eyes open and ears alert."

Sylvia is one of the most positive people I've met. She says she has removed any negative people from her life, "They are people I once knew." She has a beautiful smile and looks fabulous in her white terry robe waiting to get in the clubhouse door so she can get back in the water.

Did You Know...

Let's talk about something that makes cents. Coins. Specifically, U.S. coins. Currently, there are six U.S. coins in circulation, but at one time there was a 3-cent coin.

Trime – A trime is a 3-cent silver piece. In 1851, Congress lowered the cost of mailing a letter from 5 cents to 3 cents to compete with private mail carriers and simultaneously authorized the creation of the 3-cent trime to simplify postage transactions.

The Gold Rush – The California gold rush, which peaked in 1849, flooded the U.S. with gold, decreasing its value relative to silver. Coins such as the dime, quarter, and dollar were 90% silver and worth more than their face value. People started hoarding, melting down, and selling the silver coins. The trime, however, was 75% silver and 25% copper, making it worth more in your pocket.

Tiny Trime – One of the smallest American coins minted at just 14 millimeters in diameter, the trime's obverse featured a six-pointed star with a shield, surrounded by the words "United States of America" and the year it was made. The reverse showed the Roman numeral "III" inside a decorative "C," with 13 stars representing the 13 original colonies.

The Demise of the Trime – At first it did its job and made buying stamps easier and it circulated widely. But the coin was so small it got lost, and tarnished easily, earning the nickname "fish scales." It was replaced by the nickel following the Civil War coin shortage. The trime was finally discontinued with the Coinage Act of 1873.

Current Value – Let us just say that it is WAY over 3-cents. For all you numismatists out there, if you have a proof trime there are several zeros involved.

Coins Minted Today – \$1 coin, 50-cent piece, quarter, dime, nickel, and the penny (*which now costs 3.7 cents each to mint*).

What's Cooking?

Growing up in Rome, our basic eating concept was to follow the ingredients' seasonal change. Our favorite summer dish was a "Frittata" with freshly picked broccoli or zucchini. Here are a few simple ingredients and a few equally simple steps to cook a perfect round frittata...

Zucchini Frittata

(Serves Four)

Ingredients

5 large eggs $+ \frac{1}{2}$ cup of egg whites

5 small/medium zucchini (about 2 lbs.)

1 small/medium shallot

2 tbs Extra Virgin Olive Oil (EVOO)

Salt & Pepper to taste


Directions

Wash and pat dry the zucchini. Cut off the ends and cut the zucchini in half lengthwise, then cut into ½" slices. Peel the shallot and thinly slice. Pour EVOO in a large nonstick pan and add the shallot over a gentle flame to soften it. Add the zucchini and raise the flame to medium/high. Keep stirring (flipping) for five minutes until they have a golden tone. Lower the flame and cover. Keep stirring and flipping for another 10-15 minutes. Break the eggs in a bowl, add the egg whites and whip them. Add salt and pepper. Test the zucchini for your favorite cooking point, add salt and pepper and pour the eggs into the pan. Raise the flame to medium/ high and monitor the pan constantly. Slide the frittata onto a plate and then flip it back in the pan to cook the top side. Just a few more minutes and you will need to flip it again. When ready, slide it onto a serving plate and slice it the way you would cut a pizza!

Enjoy it with a bowl of salad, dressed with balsamic vinaigrette and a glass of white wine. Buon Appetito!

The River We Remember

By William Kent Krueger

Krueger's latest is both a mystery and historical fiction, written in a literary style of good language and well-defined characters, ones who are neither completely good nor completely bad.

Sheriff Brody Dern, the main character, is having an affair with his brother's wife.

There is a wonderful character who runs the town's restaurant. When her husband was killed in the war, she had moved to his hometown to live with her mother-in-law and raise their son. But she keeps a diary where she wrote of her former life.

The story is set in southwestern Minnesota in 1958 in the fictional town of Jewel with 4,000 residents in Black Earth County. Children play with hula hoops. People are reading *Peyton Place*. One character drives an Edsel.

On Memorial Day (Decoration Day) the almost nude body of Jimmy Quinn is found on the shore of the Alabaster River, chewed up by channel catfish. He'd been shot before he either fell or was dumped into the river. Quinn was the wealthiest man in the county, disliked by all and hated by some. There is a long list of suspects. Sheriff Dern wants the death to be called a suicide. He is certain whoever killed Quinn did so in self-defense. However, one of his deputies insists on investigating.

Many people in Jewel still hold hatred against the Japanese and Germans, and there is a long-standing prejudice against Native Americans. Noah Bluestone, a Native American, seems the most likely suspect to many. Although Noah grew up in Jewel and served in the war, he brought home a Japanese wife named Kayoko. Noah is a good target.

Even Sheriff Dern, who likes Kayoko, is angered when she bows to him, remembering the Japanese who betrayed him during the war. Krueger makes the damage of war clear in his writing. Sheriff Dern, who was a prisoner of war in Japan, says, "There were many ways of being wounded."

The novel is a collection of all the characters' stories. It is not just about remembering the past but coping with the present.



Pass the Popcorn

A fun and intense thrill ride, a sequel to the original 2016 film. Christian Wolf (Ben) is an extremely high-functioning mathematical genius on the autism spectrum. His home is an airstream trailer. He is sought out by the Deputy Director of the Financial Crimes Enforcement Center, to locate a missing Salvadorean couple and their autistic son who are believed to be in grave danger. Ben asks his estranged brother Braxton (Jon) for help. Their relationship is an uneasy one. This mission brings them together as they figure out what is behind the family's disappearance. There are surprises along the way (especially who the wife has become). The finale is a full-blown shoot-em-up with serious weaponry and explosions where we're reminded Ben is just as highly trained in guns and explosives as his brother. The movie ends on a hopeful note as the brothers talk about going camping together. There are already rumors about a third film for the Wolf brothers. I would happily look forward to it.

Another clever and stylish thriller. Violet (Meghann), a pretty young widow with a five-year old son, goes on a first date with Henry (Brandon), an attractive fellow from a dating site. Violet's sister is babysitting her boy. They meet at a gorgeous sky-high restaurant, with spectacular nighttime views of Chicago. Their evening together begins with some small talk when Violet starts receiving phone messages via "DigiDrop" from an unknown person threatening to kill her son if she doesn't kill her date. Violet is terrified for her son and sister and knows really nothing about her date. But she's smart and capable, and after some terrifying moments, figures out what's going on and saves her son, her sister and her date. Ends on a sweet, hopeful romantic note. Suspend belief on this one, and you'll enjoy it immensely.
